

March 16 th	Instituted daily COVID-19 status reports to the Board on behalf of all System Members (reduced to weekly beginning April $6^{\rm th}$)									
March 18 th	Chancellor Sharp made decision to keep our universities open for all students who preferred to stay on campus. Student services such as lodging, food service, medical care, internet access, student counseling, etc. would continue to be provided.									
March 23 rd	Guidance provided on how to handle housing and dining charges									
March 25 th	Chancellor announced the implementation of a flexible hiring freeze and for CEOs to look for every possible way to conserve resources									
March 27 th	President Trump signed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act)									
April 22	CFO conference call to provide guidance on the use of the CARES Act Funding									
April 27 th	Governor issued executive order announcing plan to gradually re-open Texas businesses									
(Week of) April 27 th	Started COVID -19 Financial Pulse Check conference calls with each member CEO/CFO									
April 30	Held CEO conference call to discuss plans for "re-opening" along with other COVID-19 response efforts and concerns





West Campus Dining Facility








Site Plan
